~ Library Report ~

Library Report: Slice 'Em & Dice 'Em Quilts, by Nancy Brenan Daniel, is very informative while being a treat to study. Put simply, this is a book full of Disappearing Nine Patches. Nine-patch blocks are so basic, and so much can be done with them; but I had no idea HOW MUCH can be done with them. The author has done serious research and experimenting with slicing and dicing the Nine-Patch block. Using her techniques, she has taught thousands of quilters how to create new and interesting designs. Daniel states that as she plays with Nine Patches, new quilts and ideas continue to emerge. This book will introduce you to 20 of her vanishing Nine-Patch quilts. My favorites are Scrap Bag Shadow Boxes, Dragonfly, and Floating Grid. Wouldn't you like to take a look? I can help you CHECK IT OUT.

~ Stashbuster Challenge ~

(updated from presentation at guild meeting)

Write down the number of yards of fabric you had come in over the previous month, and then number of yards you had go out. "Out" means out the door, donated, shipped, gifted or otherwise leaving the house, including bags of scraps or fabric given away, not necessarily used in a project. It can also mean a project completed that you keep for yourself. Use whatever method you want to estimate yardage when you are using scraps.

Here is a possible guideline:

One quarter yard out equals two 12-inch blocks made, or three 8-inch blocks made, or four 6-inch blocks made. Is that precise? No, but it will do. Report monthly, and after February, cumulatively as well.

Your accounting will look something like this:

Your Name
Month - Fabric In - 3 yards
Month - Fabric Out - 5 yards
Cumulative Fabric In - 6 yards
Cumulative Fabric Out - 11 yards

The goal is to have that cumulative fabric out number be larger than fabric in. At the end of the year, we'll draw a winner for a non-fabric prize. Every month you post progress gains you one entry in the drawing. Entries may be given to Judy Johnson or Gwen Rogers. No rules, you don't have to participate every month, but I hope you will.

First Wednesday Sewing – Group still not ready to meet in houses, meeting at the church was suggested.

Charity Quilts – Last year our guild distributed 221 quilts and 11 pet pillows to organizations helping those in need. Monthly Sew days at Sidney's Studio on Alcoa are the 2nd and 4th Thursdays, next one is Jan 27th.

Professional workshops – Current focus is Sew Days and Workshops within our membership.

Old Business

- 1) Publicity/Media Specialist Debbie Susky has agreed to be our publicity chairman. Our goal is to have more of an online presence and generate more publicity about our guild.
- 2) Barn Quilt Blocks No update. Really a warmer weather activity, as the painting needs to be outdoors.

New Business

1) Officers for 2022 – With the continued challenges of COVID, our irregular schedule of meeting and reduced attendance, the majority of the 2021 officers have agreed to continue their roles for 2022.

Motion made, second and approved to allow those officers willing to continue to serve for year 2022. Toni Shockley has agreed to serve as Membership chair and Judy Anderson has volunteered to be our Sunshine chair.

- 2) 2022 program ideas A blank sheet for program ideas is being circulated around tonight. We have a lot of talent within our guild, if there is a program you would like to see or a program, demonstration, or technique you would like to present, please add it to the list and include your name. We will be following up with you and get some of these ideas scheduled as programs and Saturday workshops.
- 3) 2022 Stashbuster Challenge Idea for a different type UFO program suggested by

Gwen Rogers. See info in the newsletter. This challenge has you track the number of pieces of fabric that come into your stash (house) versus leaving your house by month. It can be estimated as yards, blocks, projects etc., does not need to be precise. Leaving your house is defined as going out the door — donated, shipped, gifted, thrown away, or used in a project (which you might gift or keep). The goal is to have the cumulative fabric out be greater than the number in!

4) Charity Quilts – Sidney's shop – There is more fabric coming into Sidney's shop than we can sew into charity quilts with the number of current sewers. We must come up with a way to use it up or create a method to give some of it away. The shop is getting too crowded with fabric.

For anyone needing some bags of scraps – Sidney has bags for \$1. There are also some bags at the back table of various items for \$5 each. All money generated will be donated to the Guild.

<u>Program</u> - Repairing Vintage & Heirloom Quilts - Kathy Gilmore

It all began with a class in Wisconsin called "Restoring Old Quilts"; what to do with your orphan blocks. The class was interesting, but the best part was that it gave her a new idea of a method to restore the damaged family quilts she owned. Her work began with family quilts, once completed word of mouth generated calls from other family members and friends and the number of restored quilts has grown alone with her passion for the work and giving new life to these old treasures.

Of all the quilts she has restored through the years, never has there been one where the hand quilting was coming apart. It is always the fabric that has deteriorated. She replaces and repairs blocks by hand using a combination of turned under applique with very thin thread, 100 weight Invisaline thread (guessing at the name of this thread). If batting is

needed, she also replaces it. All the repair work is completed by hand with the quilt flat and the repair work completed on the upper side, not altering the hand quilting on the back side.

Several quilts having been repaired were displayed and repaired blocks and partial repaired blocks identified by Kathy. By choosing fabrics that blend with the existing blocks, from the audience it was impossible to identify a repaired/replaced block from an original.

Kathy reiterated several times that this is very time consuming, tedious work; some of the quilts had hundreds of hours invested. Her passion for the work and the joy of preserving these works of art was apparent as she talked about each quilt.

She has agreed to do a demonstration and potentially a Saturday workshop.

Potential Ideas for Swap and Exchange quilts – Myrna, Sidney, & Shirley

In past years, there have been some Swap and Exchanges where people trade fabric/blocks. Several quilts were displayed that were created after an exchange. One quilt was called Criss Cross and used a 6 inch square block, all participants provided a number of 6 inch squares that were identical. The number of squares depends upon the number of participants. If you participate, you must agree to use only good quality quilting fabric from quilt shops and your cuts must be accurate. For the Criss Cross, Myrna sewed along but used her own fabric, making it completely with Christmas fabric with no repeats. Shirley displayed her Criss Cross quilt and identified several blocks that are special to her because she remembers who gave her those blocks.

A charm quilt is one that does not have any fabric repeated, these are great for fabric/block swaps.

Another quilt done through an exchange was called Stacked Bricks. Everyone brought their group of fabric "bricks" to be shared, each person got a paper sack and added a brick to the bags until all bricks were distributed. Then everyone started sewing their bricks together one by one as they were pulled out of the paper sacks – no rearranging allowed. It was a fun activity, easy piecing and the quilt tops created were interesting and unique.

A Quillow was displayed as another sewing project idea. It is a quilt with a pocket built in that the quilt folds up into forming a pillow. Great to have in your car serves as a blanket or a pillow.

If the quild would be interested in doing any one of these type exchanges, please list it as a desired activity.

Show and Tell – Members displayed some of their recent creations.

Meeting adjourned – See you next month at the church.




